Out of those 100 students, 10 will become top-class advocates, top- class judges, or attorneys general. Remember, when we train the first 1000 students, one of them will become a Ram Jethmalani. When we educate the next 1000 students, one of them will become a Kapil Sibal, and when we educate the third 1000 students, one of them will become an Abhishek Manu Singhvi. And when we educate 100,000 students in this way, one of them will become the Chief Justice of India, like Dr. D.Y. Chandrachud. Instead of checking the students' capabilities first and then educating them, we should educate them, and the capable ones will emerge and find their own path, just like a river finds its own course.

We do not know how capable each student will be, but we know that a capable person will emerge on their own with a little training. When we educate as many people as possible, more capable individuals will come into this field. With more capable people entering the field, we will get more capable advocates, solicitor generals, attorney generals, and capable judges who will resolve cases quickly. For this, we need to bring competition into our field and remove the struggle. Furthermore, by increasing the number of trained law professionals, we will not only strengthen our legal system but also instill a sense of justice and integrity in the society. An educated and competitive legal workforce will ensure that the judiciary system remains robust and efficient. It will also foster public trust in the legal system, as people will see timely and fair resolution of cases. By providing opportunities to a larger pool of students, we are essentially investing in the future of our country's legal framework. This approach will help bridge the gap between current capabilities and the needs of a rapidly evolving society.
